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UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE SITE "LÜBECK OLD TOWN"

The medieval centre of the Hanseatic city of Lübeck has been a World Heritage Site since 1987. The historical structure of the Old Town, from the time of its founding, has been excellently preserved. Formative structures such as the Town Hall, St. Mary's church, Holsten Gate, the Salt Warehouses, St. Jacob's church and the Hospital of the Holy Spirit can be discovered on a walk through the town. The publicly accessible residen-

tial passages and historical courtyards that lie hidden behind the merchant houses are incomparable to anywhere else in the world. Our tip: Glandorps Gang, Glandorps Hof and Ilhorn Stift at Glockengießerstraße 39 to 53.

CITY WALK LÜBECK

Experience the city at your very own pace. Simply follow the red line on the map. The route takes around 2 to 2.5 hours, not including any time you spend exploring the inside of places.

1 Holsten Gate

Come on in! The Holsten Gate is Lübeck's most famous landmark and it welcomes you, with its impressive brick walls and twin towers, at the entrance to the picturesque, historical Old Town. Inside, the museum's exhibition "The Power of Trade" leads you through the eventful history of this Hanseatic city and its bold merchants.

2 Lübeck Cathedral

This three-naved church is one of the oldest monuments in Lübeck and one of the largest brickstone vaults in Northern Europe. During the air raids on Lübeck in 1942, the Lübeck Cathedral completely burnt down and the vaults collapsed. Today, it has been completely restored and it houses numerous works of art such as the 17-metre Triumphal Cross by Bernt Notke, the pulpit and the imposing Lettner clock. 3 St. Anne's Museum District

St. Anne's museum district combines the St. Anne's Museum and St. Anne's Art Gallery in a single location. The history, art and present-day reality of the Hanseatic city are brought to life in the exhibition rooms. The top floor of the 500 year-old St. Anne's Monastery houses a sequence of 25 exhibition rooms, depicting everyday life for residents of Lübeck in the Middle Ages by means of reconstructed living-rooms.

4 Günter Grass-House

In a unique, interactive exhibition, the Museum and Forum for Literature and the Fine Arts shows manuscripts, illustrations and sculptures of Günter Grass, who won the Nobel prize for Literature, thus granting an illuminating insight into this artist's extraordinary life. The children's tour "All Hands on Board" offers a thrilling walk through the Günter Grass-House for families. Glockengießerstraße 21 grass-haus.de

Willy-Brandt-House

Willy Brandt's life reflects the eventful history of Germany and Europe in the last century. The exhibition is devoted to his political life, with stimulating mise-en-scènes and multimedia offers of information. A section of the Berlin Wall is on display in the garden.

6 Museum Behnhouse/Drägerhouse

Thanks to the exhibitions in the

Museum Behnhouse/Drägerhouse, the residential culture of Goethe's time comes alive in these two palatial houses. In addition to the significant collections of paintings and sculptures from the 19th century and the Classical Modern period, the historical rooms have exhibits of interior design dating from the 18th and 19th centuries.

7 Hospital of the Holy Spirit

Alongside magnificent churches, the residents of Lübeck also built the Hospital oft the Holy Spirit in the Middle Ages, providing care to the sick and elderly in those days. Gothic frescoes deck the porch, while the nave is divided into tiny chambers, cubby-holes known as "Kabäuschen".

Tip: The idyllic burgher gardens are located behind the historical building.

8 European Hansemuseum

Embark on a thrilling voyage of discovery through 800 years of Hanseatic history, exploring the courage of the merchants, life in foreign lands, wealth and everyday life. The interplay of room dioramas, original artefacts and interactive exhibitions provides a fascinating picture of the Hanseatic League's history.

Buddenbrook House

The Buddenbrook House is the museum home of Lübeck's Nobel Prize Laureate Thomas Mann, his family and his life's work. The museum will be comprehensively refurbished in the coming years, expanding to include the neighbouring building and the permanent exhibition will undergo a complete redesign. During this time, a temporary exhibition from the museum is located in the Museum Behnhouse/Drägerhouse.

10 St. Mary's Church

The brick basilica serves as a model for the Gothic brick style of churches in the Baltic region. St. Mary's church is closely linked to the history of the city and to this day it is regarded as the church of the burghers and the Town Council Besides its impressive architecture, the windows featuring the dance of death, the astronomical clock, the Fredenhagen altar and the chapel with the bells that collapsed in 1942 are particularly worth seeing Marienkirchhof 1 st-marien-luebeck.de

11 Town Hall

Lübeck's Town Hall stands at the heart of the Old Town and is one of the most famous Gothic brickwork structures. With its impressive façade, it resembles a fairytale castle, combining architectural styles from three different centuries. The magnificent audience hall, a former court of justice, awaits you inside. Breite Straße 62 visit-luebeck.com

12 Niederegger

Lübeck is well-known for its famous Niederegger marzipan:
Located in the centre of the Old Town you can enjoy the sweet candy at Café Niederegger or buy delicious marzipan souvenirs at the shop for your loved ones at home. The exciting story of the delicacy can be experienced in the Marzipan Museum above the café. A clear highlight of the exhibition are the 12 life-sized celebrities made out of marzipan.

13 St. Peter's Church

This Romanesque church was built between 1227 and 1250. Nowadays, it is no longer a consecrated church, but instead its light, airy interior has evolved into a vibrant centre for events and exhibitions. An arts and crafts market is held here during the Christmas period. *Tip:* The observation platform offers a wonderful panoramic view of lübeck
